Here are some of the characteristics of the program.

1. The student will receive one ½ hour lesson per week (one parent/one child).
2. The student will receive one hour-long group every week (bring the whole family).
3. Payments can be made in full (\$390.00), at the beginning of the 12 week semester, or in 3 payments of \$100.00 and a final payment of \$90.00 due the first of each month starting with September 1, 2006.
4. The program will begin during the week of September 4, 2006.

About our Suzuki Teacher, Christine Rewolinski

Ms. Rewolinski began formal music studies at the University of Missouri-Columbia, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in music education, a Bachelor of Music-violin performance and a Masters of Music-violin performance degree.

She has extensive experience as an orchestral violinist and has performed with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Milwaukee Opera Orchestra, Chicago Civic Orchestra, Shreveport Symphony, Dallas Opera (sub list) and Fort Worth Symphony (sub list) as well as other area Dallas Fort Worth area ensembles.

She has taught a wide array of classroom music instruction ranging from high school and middle school orchestra to elementary school group violin (Suzuki) and general music. Ms. Rewolinski began teaching the Suzuki method in 1990 and has since has directed university sponsored Suzuki programs at Stephen F Austin University and the University of Texas at Arlington (1996-1999).

Ms. Rewolinski is currently working toward a PhD in music education and research at the University of North Texas and is a research assistant for the division of music education. Her research interests include Suzuki teacher-parent partnerships, early childhood, occupational identity and the manifestation of musicality among performing musicians and music teachers.
