Course Objectives

This course is designed to expose students to laboratory studies and field research of social processes and behaviors and to provide students with information and skills relevant to critical evaluation of the social processes. Through a combination of lectures, class discussions, experiments, activities, and assignments, I will introduce or reinforce experimental social psychological research and procedures.

Attendance Policy

Class attendance and participation are vital to grasping the course content. Students who miss class are required to find out what they missed and to acquire class notes, assignments, and missed material from another student before the next class period.

Class Participation

Research has clearly demonstrated that students who are involved in the learning process are more likely to retain information and have greater success than those who are not involved. Students earn participation points based on the exhibition of critical thinking skills regarding assigned readings and topics discussed in class and the degree to which they respect other students' opinions and contributions, regardless of whether these beliefs are contrary to their own beliefs. Students will be evaluated on participation pertaining to the quality of their contribution to class, not simply the quantity of their participation.

Fifty points of your final grade will be based on your attendance and participation in class.

You are expected to be ON TIME for all class meetings. If you are late, you run the risk of missing important announcements, directions, and discussions. If you are more than 5 minutes late, you will not be counted in attendance, and FIVE points will be deducted from your attendance grade.

Assignments

All assignments are expected to be turned in within the first 5 minutes of class. In the event that you must miss class, assignment(s) due should be turned in **prior** to the class meeting time; assignments will be accepted via e-mail if you are unable to attend the class meeting.

Assignments received after class will receive a grade of zero.

In addition, all work submitted will reflect individual effort and should not duplicate the work of anyone else. Copying another person's work, failing to acknowledge someone else's work, i.e.,

plagiarism, and duplicating any work done for other classes is not tolerated. If a student violates UTA policies regarding academic honesty (see the Section titled, “Academic Honesty” below), that student will receive a zero for the work, and I will pursue formal judicial recourse.

In-class experiment

All students will be required to design and run an experiment during the semester. A number of assignments will be given throughout the semester that will serve as a guide for conducting this experiment.

Poster Presentation

All students will be required to present the findings from the experiment they conducted at the end of the semester. More information will be provided by Dr. Kenworthy during the third week of class.

Grading

Grades will be based on number of points earned. The final grade distribution will be based on a 300-point distribution and will be strictly enforced:

- A = 270 - 300 pts (90% or higher)
- B = 240 – 269 pts (80% - 89.9%)
- C = 210 – 239 pts (70% - 79.9%)
- D = 180 – 209 pts (60% - 69.9%)
- F = under 179 pts
