Course Description:	Current theory and research in cognitive processes such as memory, information processing, concept formation, problem solving, and decision making.
Course Learning Goals/Objectives:	Students will discover the broad array of phenomena, methods, and theories underlying cognitive psychology, and learn to think about them critically.
Attendance and Drop Policy:	Students are strongly encouraged to attend class as the material on tests comes both from the textbook as well as the lectures. Students will not be punished for being absent but they will be reward for attending as follows: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. If you are present for 90% of the semester's classes, 2 points will be added to your final grade.2. If you were present on two days which will be randomly selected at the end of the semester, 1 point will be added to your final grade for each day. However you are only eligible for these points if you were present for 90% of the semester's classes.3. If you are present for 90% of the semester's classes, the lowest grade received on any of the four tests will be dropped.

Specific Course Requirements:

Four exams of equal weight (25% each). Exams will be composed of short-answer and short-essay questions.

Missed exams:

Missed exams will be accorded a grade of zero unless the student has a valid excuse recognized by the university's rules.

Final Review Week

A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week unless specified in the class syllabi. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week.
