Purpose & Goals:

In this course the student will learn about theoretical approaches and relevant research methods pertaining to the study of personality. There will be an emphasis on the development of these theories as well as how researchers study the various topics when examining an individual's personality. The student will be exposed to different approaches scientists utilize in order to better understand a complex phenomenon such as our personality.

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will gain content-specific knowledge of basic theories and principles associated with personality psychology. A major goal of this course is to make the student aware that personality psychology is a discipline that can be applied to real life in terms of understanding oneself as well as understanding others. A second major goal of this course is for students to critically evaluate theories of personality. Course content will be covered through assigned text reading, lectures, videos, classroom discussions, and group activities.

Attendance:

Attendance in this class is not mandatory. However, regular class attendance is expected in this course. Attendance will be taken sporadically throughout the course and if you are present the days I take attendance than your final letter grade will receive 2 additional points on your final letter grade. Students will be accountable for all lecture material, and each examination will contain questions from the class readings and classroom lectures, therefore it will be imperative that attend class regular. Experience has shown that students who regularly attend class are much more successful than those who do not.

Exams and Grading Policy:

Four exams will be given throughout the semester. Each exam will account for 100 points. The exams will contain a combination of multiple choice and short answer questions. Exam questions will be sampled from class lectures and assigned readings. Make-up exams will only be administered if the student provides a University approved excuse (see catalog).
