**Dr. Trevor Burnard, University of Warwick**

“Intimate Strangers: Trying to Understand Resistance to  
Slavery in Jamaica and Berbice,  
1750-1834”



*Trevor Burnard was born in New Zealand, and educated at the University of Otago, New Zealand, and the Johns Hopkins University, where he earned his Ph.D. in 1988. Burnard currently teaches early British American and Atlantic history at the University of Warwick. He held previous posts at the Universities of Sussex, Brunel, Canterbury, Waikato, and the West Indies at Mona. Burnard works on seventeenth and eighteenth century plantation British America. He has authored several monographs on eighteenth century Maryland and Jamaica, as well as numerous articles on colonial British America. His books have included Creole Gentlemen: The Maryland Elite, 1691-1776 (2002) and Mastery, Tyranny, and Desire: Thomas Thistlewood and His Slaves in the Anglo-Jamaican World (2004). He is currently working on a project with John Garrigus of the University of Texas at Arlington comparing Jamaica and Saint-Domingue between the Seven Years’ War and the start of the Haitian Revolution.*
